QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Is the NLPS concerned about the many species of birds that nest on the island?

ANSWER - By Robert Square

Our Business Plan has addressed the issue of the birds on the island. "The Board of the NLPS recognizes and respects the long established nesting habits of the many species of birds on the Nottawasaga Island and continue to consider any and all implications as we move forward with the restoration of the lighthouse in this environmentally sensitive area."

While Nottawasaga Island is not designated as a migratory bird sanctuary, it is

the DFO requiring us to have a plan that minimalizes the impact our work has on the birds.

Chair Stephen Emo and Robert had a very informative meeting with Chip Weseloh, one of Canada's premier ornithologists who worked for the Canadian Wildlife Services. He is a colonial water bird specialist and knows a great deal about Nottawasaga Island. We found it interesting that on the island there are:

- 2000 Herring Gulls
- 5000 Ringbill Gulls
- 860 Cormorant nests
- 100 Egret nests
- 100 Black-crowned Night Herons
- 20 Great Blue Heron nests

That's a lot of birds.

We centred our discussion around the lighthouse restoration, how it may impact the birds and how we can co-exist. Our footprint on the island will be around the lighthouse on the west side and an access corridor from the proposed dock site to the light. Chip suggested that we run that pathway from the dock left along the south shore then up to the lighthouse. This suggested route should have little impact to the birds. If we go up the centre of the island we impact egret nests. This we do not want to do. Interesting, this is the same route suggested by the Chippewas last week. This suggested area should have no lasting impact on the Egrets & Herons. We assured Chip that there will be no construction on the island beyond restoration of the tower, house and the dock.

The Egrets and Herons are the species of concern. Staying around the lighthouse should be okay as they nest in the middle and to the east side out of the prevailing wind. The west side is populated mainly with Gulls and Cormorants. The Ring Bill Gulls are opportunistic, lazy birds which don't build nests. Most gulls, if they do not like what's happening readily relocate. They are protected as a migratory species by the federal government. Cormorants are under the jurisdiction of the province and they are disliked by the MNR (Ministry of Natural Resources) as they deplete the fish stocks and destroy the vegetation. Chip would like to go out to the island in late October or early November to point out any areas of concern. Another step forward.
