FUN FACT



In 2004, a large portion of face of the lighthouse fell to the ground as a result of what we believe was a lightning storm. The late Jim Kilgour,, supported by then Mayor Terry Geddes, campaigned on the Tower's behalf and in August 2005 the Minister of Fisheries and Oceans announced \$230,000 in federal funds for improved lightning protection and

stabilization of the lighthouse. The banding was completed and expected to be effective for 5 years, giving organizers time to raise money for a complete restoration.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

When you talk about the contamination that needs remediation, to what are you referring?

ANSWER - written by Stephen Emo and Gary Norman

One of the stumbling blocks to obtaining ownership is the contamination both inside the tower and the land immediately surrounding it. Inside, the contamination is mainly the lead paint used on the limestone walls, wood railings and stairs. Another contamination is the presence of mold. Both are solvable and the cleanup is necessary to provide a safe working environment when restoration of the lighthouse occurs.

The restoration company that will complete this part of the cleanup will take all steps necessary to ensure that there will not be any contaminated material flowing into Georgian Bay.

Outside the tower contaminants exist in small, localized spots around the light. Cadmium, copper, zinc, barium are found in small amounts while lead and mercury deposits are in more substantive amounts but isolated to a few areas. The most challenging are the lead and mercury. These areas around the base

light and the mercury on which the light rotated. These materials were simply tossed over the side of the lantern room.

Two options are available to the NLPS:

- One is to remove the soil completely and transport it off the island.
- The other is to cap the problem areas and then place new soil on top, creating a safe environment. Both options are acceptable to the Chippewas of Nawash and the Department of Fisheries and Oceans.

We continue to work with all concerned parties to ensure that we protect the wildlife and aquatic species that live on and around Nottawasaga Island.


